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#### 3rd Grade Basic Math Fact Assessment

#### Math Facts:

Students must score in the \*proficient or \*advanced categories at least 1 time during the school year on the addition, subtraction, and multiplication timed test.

\*Advanced - 98 - 100 out of 100 problems \*Proficient - 90 - 97 out of 100 problems

Students must score in the \*proficient or

#### Math Application:

\*advanced categories at least 1 time during the school year on the addition, subtraction, and multiplication math application test.

\*Advanced - 5 out of 5 problems

\*Proficient - 4 out of 5 problems

Students not meeting these criteria will attend summer school for only the area in which they are not advanced or proficient. Students may test out as soon as they meet the criteria above.

#### 3rd Grade Exit Criteria

#### Reading and Language

- ♦ Understand and know how to use nouns, verbs, pronouns, adjectives, prefixes and suffixes.
- Reads and follows simple 3 step, written directions.
- ♦ Decodes grade level vocabulary words using phonetic strategies and context clues.
- Reads and comprehends material at a 3.5 grade level using the seven comprehension strategies.
- Identifies the reading genres of fantasy, reality, fiction, and non-fiction.
- Scores at a Basic or above on the WKCE.

#### Math

- Score basic or higher on Basic Math Facts and Math Applications Criteria..
- Read and interpret time, on a standard clock, to the nearest minute.
- Identifies length/ruler, volume/liquid, mass/ weight.
- Recognize and identify an odd or even number.
- Read any whole number up to 9,999 and given a number in a word form up to 9,999 can correctly write it in standard form.
- Identifies and creates basic shapes and number of sides or angles of the following: circle, square, triangle, rectangle, octagon, and hexagon.
- ♦ Identifies and understands fractions.
- ♦ Calculate area and perimeter
- Add and subtract larger numbers with regrouping.

### Third Grade Classroom Expectations

#### Behavior Plan

We use an Assertive Discipline plan. Students are given a warning, lose recess time for additional infractions, and may earn class rewards for good behavior. A classroom behavior plan will be sent home at the beginning of the year.

#### Homework Requirement

We have daily take home folders. Assignment notebooks will be filled out by the student each day.

#### Homework Expectations:

- ♦ Read 20 minutes each night
- Practice math facts 10 minutes each night
- Complete any daily work not finished in class
- ♦ Practice spelling words

#### GENERAL HOMEWORK TIPS FOR PARENTS

- Make sure your child has a quiet, well-lit place to do homework. Avoid having your child do homework with the television on or in places with other distractions, such as people coming and going.
- Make sure the materials your child needs, such as paper, pencils and a dictionary, are available.
- **Be positive about homework.** Tell your child how important school is. The attitude you express about homework will be the attitude your child acquires.



#### Third Grade Goals

#### MAPS Test/WKCE

Students must achieve academic competency on the MAPS test and/or the WKCE.

- ♦ Students must score 198 or higher in Math and 198 in Reading.
- ♦ Students must score Basic or higher on the WKCE-CRT in both Reading and Math.

#### On Demand

Students must achieve writing competency.

• Writing— Students must receive at least one "at grade level" score on an On Demand Prompt.

#### Guided Reading Level

 Students must be at a minimal guided reading level of P.

Students who do not meet recommendations may be retained and/or required to attend summer school.

#### Healthy Snack

Students need to bring a healthy snack to be eaten during a break. Chips or candy are not allowed unless it is a special occasion/party. Fruit, raw vegetables, and crackers are a great snack and will help give your child the energy he or she needs to work hard throughout the day.
